Did you know that

December Family Reading Tip of the Month: Make Connections

When children make connections between their book and their own lives, the world around them, and other books they have read, they can better understand what they are reading.

You can ask:

- If you were the main character, what would you do?
- How is this book similar to or different from another book you have read?
- What are some things in this book you wonder about?


Help your child make connections by asking questions about what they read!



Endings Matter!

Suffixes are small parts added to the end of words, like *-less* in *endless* or *-s* in *propels*. Just like a sperm whale's tail adds power to its swim, a **suffix** can add power to your words! Knowing about **suffixes** helps you understand and use words better.

In this activity, you'll use clues to figure out which **suffix** best fits the blank spaces in the sentences. Watch out, though. To make things more interesting, we've added a few sneaky **suffixes** that don't belong to any of the words!




Pusmer Key: steering, largest, listed, inches, feeder

Vocabulary Voyage!

Learning new and tricky words can feel a bit scary at first, like jumping into the deep end of a pool. But don't worry! Just like learning to swim, the more new words you learn, the better you'll understand different books.

propels (p. 7) When something **propels** itself, it pushes itself in a certain direction. A giant squid **propels** itself forward by sucking water into its head and then squeezing it out.



Something that is **submerged** goes under water and stays there. Sperm whales can hold their breath and stay **submerged** under water for 45 minutes.

agile (p. 21)

If something is **agile**, it can move quickly and easily. Giant squid are **agile** because they can change direction quickly and swim backwards.

darts (p. 28)

If something **darts**, it moves very quickly from one place to another. The giant squid **darts** away from the whale after it blows ink into the whale's face.

Imagine this: you are aboard a deep-sea fishing boat, trying to bring in a massive fish that's tangled in your net.

But wait, it's not a fish. It's a ... you get to choose! Did you catch a giant squid, a sperm whale, or perhaps both? Write about your thrilling deep-sea fishing adventure on a postcard to a friend. Be sure to use all of your new vocabulary words in your message.
