Beat of the Drum!

A **simile** is a type of *figurative language* used to compare two things using the words *like* or *as*.

For example:

"Her smile is as bright as the sun." "He runs like a cheetah."

In these examples, the first **simile** <u>compares</u> a smile to the brightness of the sun, while the second **simile** compares someone's running speed to that of a cheetah.

New and Interesting Words



When something happens in a **rhythm**, there is a repeating series of sounds or actions. When Celia dances, she moves to the **rhythm** of her heart and to the beat of the drum.



A **melody** is a tune or song. Celia's neighbors love to hear her sing her **melodies**.



When someone talks about **culture**, they are talking about the language, food, music, and customs of people from a country. People from all over the world move to New York, making it a blend of many **cultures**.

If you **honor** someone, you give them special praise or attention. Many people love Celia's music and **honor** her by calling her the "Queen of Salsa."
