
Passport to New Worlds Reading

A traveling partner: Share your books and what you're reading with others. Ask them questions, or share your favorite parts.



Must See: Baobab trees and


wild orchids

Animals: Look for ring-tailed lemurs, chameleons, fossas, and aye-ayes.

Most of the plants and animals found in Madagascar are not found anywhere else in the world! Look for the long-lived baobab trees! Sometimes, they're called "upsidedown trees" because their branches look like roots sticking up in the air!

Did you notice that some of the colored words are opposites, or *antonyms*? What antonyms did you find?




Location: North Africa

Animals: Here, you will find Egyptian vultures, Nile crocodiles, and striped hyenas!

The Nile River has been the center of Egyptian

the center of Egyptian culture for over 5,000 years. Ancient Egyptians invented paper and writing. They also contributed to mathematics, medicine, agriculture, and art. A visit to Egypt brings history to life!

Ancient Egyptians used a picture-based writing called *hieroglyphics* to share their stories. Use your own pictures to retell a scene from your latest read. Feel free to change the ending, but make sure to show the order of events!

Saudi Arabia changes when you look under the water. Changing your perspective (the way you view things) gives you new information, new experiences, and a new way of seeing situations. Think about the last fiction book you read, and answer these questions on another piece of paper:

- In what ways do you agree or disagree with the main character's perspective of the main problem in the story?

Primary Language: Ukrainian **Must See:** The Pysanka

Animals: Stoats, moose, and barn owls roam the

woodlands.

Farming helped Ukraine to be known as the "breadbasket of Europe." The country is also recognized for its pysanky tradition. *Pysanky* refers to eggs decorated with beeswax and dyes. They are a symbol of hope and are created and shared every spring.



Books, like countries, can be difficult to share in just a few words. If you had to tell a friend about the last book you read in just a few sentences, what would you say? Use the following questions as a guide to help you summarize the book.



- What's the central idea of the story?
- Explain what happens in the beginning, middle, and end of the story.
- Who are the main characters, and what are they trying to achieve?
- What is the problem or conflict, and how is it resolved?
- What are the most important events that move the story forward?

Prefixes – come at the beginning of the word

micro-	small
tele-	far off

Suffixes – come at the *end* of the word

Suffix	Meaning
-phone	sound
-scope	viewing device




