<u>Reading Partner Tip:</u> Encourage your child to talk about their favorite activity by asking them to imagine doing what they love most. Then invite them to explain what it is and why it brings them joy.

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
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Exploring My World

Touch things in your house, Round and square, high and low. How many shapes can you name? What shapes do you know?

October - My Home

Circle: A circle is round and smooth. It does not have corners. Can you find or name something at home that is shaped like a circle?



November - Outside My Front Door

Circle: What round things might you find outside your front door?



Rectangle: A rectangle has four sides. Two sides are longer, and two sides are shorter. Which has a rectangle shape: a shoe or a shoebox?

January - My Neighborhood

Square: A square has four sides that are the same length. Candy bars from the store break into little square pieces. Yum!

February - My School

Circle: A circle is like a big loop. It is round and does not have edges. Tell a grown-up about your favorite circle-time story or game at school.











March - My Town

Triangle: A triangle has three sides and three pointy corners. A pizza slice is a triangle you can eat! What does it feel, smell, and taste like?



April - My State

Rectangle: A rectangle has four corners where the sides come together like points. Florida's flag is full of shapes! It has four white triangles and one circle.



May - My Country

Circle: A circle rolls smoothly, like the wheels on a vehicle. Imagine a car with wheels that are squares instead of circles. Describe what your ride would feel like.



June - My World

Circle: Our earth is round, like a circle. Use your whole arm, and slowly make a giant circle in the air.




Welcome back home!

Reading Partner Tip: Help your child discover shapes and colors in daily life through touch, guiding them to explore their surroundings. To aid their understanding and sensory experience, describe colors as they feel different objects. Ask them to talk about what they feel and imagine as they explore shapes.

Reading Partner Tip: Words with simple, predictable patterns help your child understand connections between letters, sounds, and words. Ask your child to say the rhyming words together with you. Extend this activity by rhyming short, simple words together with your child; even silly, made-up words are fine!

Reading Partner Tip: By combining two smaller words, your child learns to make new words. This helps them understand how words are formed. Offer a brief explanation of each new word to help build your child's vocabulary. Look around and see if there are any household objects you can name to practice with your child.

Reading Partner Tip: Your child can get ready for reading and learning new words by removing smaller words from longer ones. Use the example to explain the activity to your child. Have them work through each word by saying both parts of the word. Then mimic throwing away while saying the piece of the word you are removing. Finally, use the remaining word to say the answer.

Reading Partner Tip: Discussing books with your child increases their language skills and helps them understand what has been read to them. Make reading special by asking your child which comfy spot they will choose for special reading time together.

Reading Partner Tip: Recognizing letters kickstarts the reading process for children. Discuss letters in words for everyday items, like <u>cat</u>, <u>dog</u>, and <u>ball</u>, focusing on one letter at a time. Ask your child to repeat the letters as you say them.

Reading Partner Tip: When children retell stories, it helps them recall details, understand event sequences, and express their ideas. After you read together, ask your child to retell the story in their own words.


