Must Visit: Iguazu Falls

Animals: Here, you'll find slow sloths, stealthy

jaguars, and rare Amazon river dolphins!



There are about 400 billion trees in the Amazon River Basin and 10% of the world's species of animals. Brazil is a wild place! Explore the amazing Iguazu Falls, over 200 feet tall and over 1.25 miles wide.

Brazil is a fascinating place. Imagine if your latest read was set in Brazil. How would changing the setting change the story? Retell your favorite scene from the book, but change the setting:

Time to fly across the Atlantic Ocean. Your next destination has more wilderness to explore but not as much water.

Location: An island off the southeast coast of Africa **Primary Language:** Malagasy, French **Must Visit:** Baobab trees and wild orchids

Animals: Search for ring-tailed lemurs, chameleons,

aye-ayes, and fossas.



Most of the plants and animals found in Madagascar are not found anywhere else in the world! Visit the long-lived baobab trees! Sometimes, they're called "upside-down trees" because their branches appear to be roots sticking up in the air!


Must Visit: In Giza, the Sphinx and the Great Pyramid (one of the Seven Wonders of the World)

It's time to share. Now, act out your story for someone else to enjoy!

You might not think about swimming when you learn that Saudi Arabia is mostly desert. But once you put on your snorkel mask and explore underwater, you'll find coral reefs and tropical fish galore!

Saudi Arabia changes when you explore under the water. Changing your perspective (the way you view things) gives you new information and experiences and a new way of understanding situations. Think about the last fiction book you read, and answer these questions.

- ☐ What is the perspective of the main character of the last book you read?
- Does the author want you to think a certain way about the subject? How can you tell?
- In what ways do you agree or disagree with the main character's perspective of the main problem in the story?
- How would the book change if the author added additional perspectives to the story?

Farming helped Ukraine to be known as the "breadbasket of Europe." The country is also recognized for its pysanky tradition. **Pysanky** refers to eggs decorated with beeswax and dyes. They are a symbol of hope and are created and shared every spring.

oceans, North of Australia


Primary Language: Indonesian
